ACCREDITATION ASSESSMENT TEAM INVITES PUBLIC COMMENT

Sayreville Police Department / Middlesex County, NJ – On Monday, December 22, 2025 the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police (NJSACOP) will examine all aspects of the Sayreville Police Department's Public Safety Emergency Communications Center's policies and procedures, management, operations, and support services Chief Daniel Plumacker announced today.

"Verification that the Sayreville Police Department Public Safety Communications Center meets the Commission's "best practices" standards is part of a voluntary process to achieve accreditation, a highly prized recognition of law enforcement professional excellence", Chief Daniel Plumacker said.

As part of this final on-site assessment, agency employees and members of the general public are invited to provide comments to a NJSACOP Assessor. They may do so by telephone or email. The public may call 732-427-5870 on December 22, 2025, between the hours of 10:00 am –11:00 am. Email comments can be sent to Lieutenant Tom Sheehan at tsheehan@sayreville.com

Telephone comments are limited to 5 minutes and must address the agency's ability to comply with the NJSACOP Public Safety Communications Centers standards. Please contact Lieutenant Tom Sheehan at tsheehan@sayreville.com for information about the standards.

The Sayreville Police Department Public Safety Communications Center must comply with NJSACOP standards in order to achieve accredited status. Chief Plumacker indicated, *“Accreditation results in greater accountability within the agency, reduced risk and liability exposure, stronger defense against civil lawsuits, increased community advocacy, and more confidence in the agency’s ability to operate efficiently and respond to community needs.”*

The Accreditation Program Director for the New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police is Mr. Harry J Delgado, Ed.S. *“The assessment team is composed of law enforcement practitioners from similar New Jersey law enforcement agencies. The assessors will review written materials, interview agency members, and visit offices and other places where compliance with the standards can be observed. Once the Commission’s assessor completes their review of the agency, they will report to the full Commission, which will then decide if the agency is to be granted accredited status”*, Harry J Delgado stated.

Accreditation is valid for a three-year period during which time the agency must submit annual reports attesting to their continued compliance with those standards under which it was initially accredited.

The New Jersey State Association of Chiefs of Police through its New Jersey Law Enforcement Communications Accreditation Commission is the legitimate authority and accreditation agency in the state of New Jersey.
